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c) Background of the Organization

SJA is a Bangladeshi origin non-profit making private voluntary development organization aiming to provide sustainable measures to improve the conditions of the deprived people especially women and children.

SJA was established in August 1991 by a small group of philanthropists, led by former United Nations Volunteer (under UNDP, Nepal) A H M Faisal Ahmed. They aimed to develop a locally based, not-for-profit and non-political development organization that would operate at a "grassroots" level to address the real needs of economically and socially marginalized members of the community in Sylhet.

Initially, the organization specialized in youth development projects to develop young people's skills and thereby their economic prospects by developing their ability to mobilize manage and control local and external resources by themselves. Since then, SJA is in the journey of a stream of human development activities and has involved itself in development innovation along with quantitative and qualitative expansion.

SJA's philosophy has always been to empower the most disadvantaged in the community by equipping them with the skills, resources and confidence to improve their own quality of life. Full participation from the community is a core feature of SJA's projects and the organization's success may be largely attributed to its flexibility in responding to the needs of the people. Through its work, SJA has always strived to develop its own organizational capacity, particularly in participatory planning, the designing of realistic programs and implementing effective monitoring and quality control initiatives.

SJA has 29 years of working experiences in the development field by skilled manpower with adequate knowledge on group/CBO's management, mobilizing community people, conducting a mass campaign on different development issues, conducting of rights-based and service delivery intervention, jointly working experience with GoB, LGI and other organizations, SJA has also the working experiences at the whole seven division of the country effectively. The organization now focuses its efforts on Human Rights especially to end Gender Base Violations (GBV); Good Governance; Children Development; Combating diseases like HIV/AIDS, malnutrition; social wounds like poverty, illiteracy, unemployment; and issues like disability, health and family planning, environment and climate change, water resource management, water and sanitation and contributing to achieving 9 goals out of 17 of Sustainable Development Goals.

SJA's project/programs are being supported by renowned foreign donors, INGO, UN organizations, foreign charities, different ministries of the Government of Bangladesh, and other national organizations. In addition, has vast expertise and experiences to work on collaboratively by the formation of association with like-minded organizations as Lead Organization and as well as an associate partner of the different consortium.

By its efforts, SJA facilitates the impact among its targeted beneficiaries and plays the role of catalyst giving due attention to sustainable impact to ensure the expected changes in their lives.



d) Vision & Mission

SJA's vision is to build a society free from poverty, hunger, illiteracy and all forms of discrimination based on gender and ethnicity. SJA dreams of a society that the disadvantaged, discriminated and excluded communities enjoy a life with all rights.

SJA's mission is to establish a well-organized community by accommodating socially excluded populations with healthy, literate individuals who are both motivated and empowered to improve their socioeconomic status. SJA believes that, through ensuring partnership and active participation of local people, together we can develop the capacity to make productive uses of the local resources to protect climate change for the future generation.

Women and children, the most vulnerable group of the population, are the primary concern of SJA. SJA is committed to works to bring sustainable changes in the life of deprived people.

SJA's interventions are committed to connecting the disadvantaged, discriminated and excluded groups with knowledge, usable skills, rights & justice, access to good health and have a safe environment as a right. While pursuing this mission, SJA follows a set of values internally and externally.

e) Inspiration and Values of SJA

SJA reflects the aspiration, desires and needs of the youth and gives them an opportunity to directly shape their destinies. Composed of young men and women who are united by their sense of virtue and wisdom, SJA seeks to ensure good leadership at all levels.

f) Target Population

All disadvantaged groups who are socially and/or economically excluded from society. These include destitute women, youth, adolescents and children, and those living below the poverty line, the landless, disabled, female sex workers and ethnic minorities.

g) Area of Operation (Present Working Area)

Since its inception, SJA has enormous long-term working experience in the various sectoral program, these sectoral specializations are:

1. Health and Nutrition Program:

- under this health and nutrition sector program as a long-term (October'1995 to December'2004) associate of UK DFID, SJA has implemented Community Based Essential Service Package the which included components of: reproductive health care, child health care, communicable disease control and prevention (TB, Leprosy), limited curative care and behavior change communication, maternal nutrition, ARI, diarrhoeal disease control, adolescent health care, referral and follow-up under DFID's SHAPLA program; Integrated Maternal Child Health & Family Planning, Safe motherhood and Community Clinic Pilot Project in Sylhet district. Considering the adolescent special health and social needs and particularly benefit from a supportive home and community environment. To address this, SJA has initiated as a part of its reproductive health, a health service component focused on the needs of adolescents with the aims to provide clear information regarding common reproductive health problem of adolescent, a counseling service and individual case management including referral to local specialized facilities where necessary.
- with the financial support of UNICEF along with the association of PHD, SJA had implemented Maternal and Neonatal Health Project at the four upazilas of Moulvibazar district by providing support for quality planning, implementation and monitoring of community support system (ComSS) interventions.
- in the year of 2003, the MOHFW handed over Charcandi community clinic to SJA which is located at Biswanath Upazila of Sylhet district. SJA independently manages & runs the community clinic as a pilot project and gradually actively involved the local community people and provide quality of services for the targeted population. Notably, SJA is the first NGO in Sylhet division that has such responsibilities to run GoB Clinic for ensuring health services independently as a model.
- in June'2001, with a special focus on Nutrition for rural women, SJA started its separate Integrated Nutrition Programme in Derai Upazila of Sunamgonj district.
- for the last 19 years, SJA is working on tobacco control issues in Sylhet Division as a pioneer and active member of the Bangladesh Anti-Tobacco Alliance (BATA). SJA organized advocacy, a number of divisional level capacity building workshops, seminars and campaigns by which many district-level organizations of the division involved in tobacco control. SJA contributed national-level tobacco control movement for the development of tobacco control law before it has passed in the National Parliament in 2005 and amendment in 2013.



2. STI-HIV/AIDS Prevention Program:

SJA has 22 years of experience in the long run of STI-HIV/AIDS prevention program without any interruption. Since 1998 SJA has incorporated STI-HIV/AIDS prevention program in the Sylhet city and lead its region as a pioneer of this field. Particularly SJA is one of the first organizations in the country that has initiated Sex Workers intervention with a huge challenges of reducing high stigma. Gradually, SJA expanded its STI-HIV/AIDS prevention program at all over Bangladesh. Under this project SJA has been and had been implemented a good number of projects these are:

3. Education Program: including Non-Formal Education (both primary and adult education):

Since its inception, SJA has been given the highest priority to the Education sector program and by these years SJA has successfully completed and been implementing good numbers of Education projects. SJA has vast knowledge and experiences on non-formal primary education in both primary and adult education, preprimary education and on early childhood development with the foreign donor, national NGO and government funding support. SJA has membership with the Bangladesh ECD Network (BEN) and CAMPE. In addition, SJA has expertise in conducting different trade courses. In collaboration and cooperation with the GOB, Donors and National NGOs the following projects had implemented and been implementing in this sector:

4. Child Protection and Early Childhood Development Program:

Sylhet Jubo Academy (SJA)'s work is underpinned by the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC); SJA is committed to ensuring the fulfillment of children's rights including their rights to protection. SJA is committed to protecting children from harm and ensuring children's right to protection under Article 19 of the UNCRC is fully realized. We take seriously our responsibility to promote child safe practices and protect children from harm, abuse, neglect and exploitation in any form. In addition, we will take positive action to prevent those who abuse children from becoming involved with SJA and take stringent measures against any SJA staff, SJA Associates, SJA visitors, or SJA managers who abuse a child. Our decisions and actions in response to Child protection concerns and breaches of SJA developed child protection which is guided by the principle of 'the best interests of the child'. To make children aware of their development, protection and rights SJA regularly celebrating World Children's Day and Children Rights Week. Under this sector SJA has implemented and been implementing various projects, these are:

5. Environmental Protection and WASH Program:

SJA has more than 20 years of experience in WASH sector. At the very beginning, SJA had been implemented WASH sector program with the support of NGO-Forum and UNICEF. Later-on from 2006 to 2012 with the support of WaterAid. SJA had been implemented two projects under the Advancing Sustainable Environmental Health (ASEH) program namely Community Participated Sustainable Water, Hygiene and Sanitation Project AND Enhancing Environmental Health by Community Organization. The aims of both projects were to (i) ensure access to safe water supply and sanitation options (ii) maintain and continual use of safe water supply and sanitation facilities along with sustainable hygiene practices (iii) built the capacity of users, formal and informal institutions to promote. SJA has implemented two WASH projects "Community Participated Safe Water Project" in two districts where more than 2000 STWs have been installed. SJA enhanced community participation under the concept of "for the people and with the people" which is one of the major innovations of this project to make it more cost-effective.

6. Disability Program:

This program includes Community based rehabilitation, assistive device support, special education along with sign language; social inclusion, mainstreaming education and creating disable friendly environment.

Since 1999 SJA has been working for the "People Living with Disabilities" through community-based rehabilitation (CBR) in Sylhet district. SJA is serving for multiple-disability like CP, Intellectual disabled, Deaf, Physical disabled, etc. Moreover, SJA is the pioneer in the Sylhet division for working with the Deaf community in the country. The services that provided to the deaf community are Bengali sign language training to deaf children, youths and their carers/parents, provide agro-based and computer training for deaf children & youths, operation of the functional literacy center will meet the basic education needs of deaf children and also contribute in sensitizing communities, advocacy and sensitization session with different stakeholders, the formation of carer groups etc.

By this period SJA received support from renowned donors and government organizations for performing its activities on disability are: ABILIS Foundation Finland, SLF Netherlands, NFOWD, ActionAid Bangladesh, IDCS-UK, CDD-European Union, Handicap International and Jatio Protibondhi Unnayan Foundation.

This service of components includes to, create mass awareness, education for children & youth with disabilities, conducts training, employment of youth with disabilities, PRT, provide the assistive device, counseling, IGA, providing health services and different kind of facilities, creating accessibility for children and youth with disabilities in different sectors and creating mass awareness regarding disability at the community level.

One of the very successful imitative of SJA is to provide training on disability to the Health Personals of Golapgonj Upazila Health Complex and able to convince respective officials to open a separate wing to provide services to the disabled people within the health complex compound.

7. Rights and Social Justice Program:

SJA has been implementing justice sector program since 2003 with the effective technical support from different international donor agencies. Among them, SJA has implemented the Gender, Knowledge, Networking and Human Rights Intervention in Bangladesh Project with the financial support of AED/USAID with the association of BLAST from the year of 2003 to 2006, in aiming to generate policy-relevant knowledge on gender-related rights violation, influence the justice-seeking behavior of individuals victimized of human rights violation and create gender social capital at household and community level. The major activities were mediation (Salish), along with 3 issues regarding local justice concerning women: - Marital (dowry, divorce, custody of children, polygamy), - Economic (inheritance), & - Transgression of sexual codes.

Moreover, to address domestic violence (DV) issues at the community and family level, SJA has also been implemented Community Mobilisation to End Violence against Women (CMPEVAE) since March 2005 with the assistance of Oxfam-GB at the 4 districts of Sylhet division. The project introduces a development paradigm in gender and development to end VAW. It complements and facilitates the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, CEDAW, The Beijing Declaration, MDG, PRSP and 'Jatio Nari Unnoyan Nitimala' of GoB. This project aims to create mass awareness and look for essential changes in people's thoughts, values, attitudes and behavior at the community and family level. The project preventive program such as awareness-raising, group formation and meeting, school program, drama/folk song, etc. including campaign and responsive mode activities such as support to survivors, counseling, referral, advocacy and communication with the law-enforcing agency (Police), hospital/health personnel and judiciary.

SJA has executed Protecting Human Rights (PHR) program in Balagonj Upazila under Sylhet district with the support of Plan International/USAID. The main strategy of this project is to make Union Parishad active by responding to cases properly and make them aware of existing laws. Human rights violation especially violence against women is widespread and increasing. The less empowered and destitute women are deprived of their basic rights in the society. To address Human Rights especially Domestic Violence (DV) issues at the community and family level, the organization has been implementing PHR project. The PHR is one of the most important projects' in response to developing justice-seeking behavior, access to justice, establishing equal gender and to end VAW at the community & family level. Through this program, SJA intends to reduce all kinds of violence that make the people's life miserable. Community-level mediation, psycho-social counseling, awareness building; helping Union Parishad for handling disputes lawfully and legal service support are the main component of this project. SJA has been implementing this project with effective and strong networking with Lawyers of District Bar, BNWLA, BLAST and other legal service provider organizations.

SJA has implemented Justice for All-Moulvibazar as a partner of JFA program funded by the NCSC-US Agency for International Development (USAID). This project's goal was to "ensure justice for all especially most marginalized and vulnerable people of 67 Unions of 7 Upazilas under Moulvibazar District". The project creates mass awareness of the facilities and benefits of Government Legal Aid Service, focuses to improve legal aid services at the local level, increased governance in the judiciary and increased awareness on legal



aid issues through empowering citizens and increase access to justice and building a strategic partnership. This project was supported in the activation of the government legal aid system from the District Legal Aid Committee to Union Parishad Legal Aid Committee.

The project targeted the poor and excluded; particularly young people, women, children and minorities aiming to support sustainable improvements in the way that formal justice is withheld at the local level, ensuring that the system is more responsive to those most in need.

Moreover, the project works to increase the visibility of legal aid services, facilitates in organizing coordination meetings with relevant stakeholders and duty bearers. The meetings create a space to make legal aid services accountable, available and accessible.

Also, in the year of 2009-2010 SJA has implemented a project titled "Ensuring Access to Justice for Women Victims and Poor People by Activating Village Court and Arbitration Council of Union Parishad" with the support of MJF.

Besides these, SJA has been providing psychosocial counseling to the victims of DV in One stop Crisis Center (OCC) under the Multi-Sectoral Programme on Violence Against Women with the support of GoB. Consequently, under the PRP of Bangladesh police SJA has been SJA has been providing psychosocial counseling to the victims of DV at Kotwali Model Police Station, Sylhet.

8. Livelihood and Economic Development Program:

SJA has more than 25 years of experience of implementing food security and livelihood programs through its different programs. The livelihood program was part of the crosscutting issue to address the unmet needs and create the opportunity for alternative livelihood. SJA worked to increase knowledge and skills training, including networking and soft-skills support; relate to existing or complementary market analysis with a focus on potential opportunities as well as existing opportunities; train female beneficiaries on homestead gardening and support with seeds in collaboration with the Department of Agricultural Extension in growing nutritious crops, as well as train using local techniques of safe food storage; linking job market and local production expanding food and handicraft markets aiming to sustainably improve food security and nutrition. No specialized human resource SJA was used for this project. The project staff was trained on how to develop and implement cost-effective food security and livelihood programs in collaboration with others. The most innovations of the SJA team were adding resources through collaboration with GO/NGO service providers for skill-building training, material and business startup support, etc.

9. Humanitarian-Emergency Response/Disaster and Risk Reduction:

SJA has more than 25 years of experience of providing humanitarian support especially to the affected poor victims of natural disasters and climate change (extreme cold season). Under this humanitarian aid support, SJA successfully implemented a good number of projects (organize satellite clinics, relief material distribution, post-flood rehabilitation, built safe latrine, installed tube-well, built shelter, provide agriculture seed, etc.), supported by AusAID, CIDA, DFID, WaterAid, MC-UK, Penny Appeal UK, Friends of Khasdobir-UK etc. In recent past few years, SJA successfully responded to the massive disaster and extreme cold, like Rice 4 Life project that provides 46000 kgs of rice to 1150 families, Emergency response to flood-affected victims, Winter Campaign in Sylhet and Chittagong divisions ensured live-saving materials and nutritious food supplement.

During the recent coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, we all are gravely concerned by this situation since the daily lives, health and wellbeing of all the people are badly affected and day by day the situation was worsted and this result in major hindrances by aggressively putting more people into poverty, and another setback for the country was to address the economic crisis which leads to hunger and starvation.

In this situation, SJA came forward voluntarily with its own resources in April'20 has implemented a number of interventions (collaboration and concern of the district administration of Sylhet, Chattagram & Cox's Bazar) to address on health crisis & mass awareness campaign on how to protect from COVID-19, Quarantine & Social distancing were van campaign/miking, information board displayed in 10 crowded public places, setting up handwashing facilities for the mass population and distributed of precautionary materials like a face mask, soap, hand sanitizers and provided family food packs to the 300 low-income poor.



Later on, with the external support SJA responds with comprehensive efforts in two specific areas (i) Provide food supplements to control starvation and (ii) Provide preventive care for healthy living among the 450 low-income families during to the pandemic period. Also, all of SJA's pre-primary education kids were provided nutritious food and health precautionary materials accordingly from the respective projects.

Under this humanitarian response and disaster & risk reduction program SJA's implemented projects are:

10. Infrastructural Development (Construction and Renovation) Program:

Under this program SJA had been and has been implementing a good number of constructions and renovation works at the government primary schools, government girl's orphanage and other institutions. The orphanage renovation program's ultimate goal is to ensure that the Girls of the orphanage have access to comprehensive health and hygiene facilities; improving their health condition, dignity, quality education, and security to produce a healthy and productive citizen. This scheme should provide not only renovation and repairing works of damaged toilets and shower rooms, but should also educate the orphan girls concerning health and hygiene issues.

And the government primary schools' renovation and construction work goal is to ensure an uninterrupted favorable/positive learning atmosphere for the children of mainstream primary education of rural community/areas to ensure sustainable quality education at the grassroots. These proposed projects have been undertaken in view of the extreme hardship of Govt. Primary schools of the rural and hard-to-reach area of Moulvibazar, Sunamgonj and Sylhet district under Sylhet division. These school buildings are in hazardous conditions that are not permissible for child safety and quality education, during rain & hot time mostly classes terminated/canceled. By this time SJA has been successfully completed the following projects:

i) Governance & Management Structure

Properly Constituted Executive Committee/Managing Body: SJA has approved constitution from the Department of Social Welfare, Ministry of Social Welfare under the Voluntary Social Welfare Agencies (Registration & Control) Ordinance 1961 (which accepted by the NGO Affairs Bureau). SJA holds elections regularly as per the mandate of its constitution. SJA has a legally constituted Executive Board as per the provision of its Constitution and after every election, approval has been taken from the registering authority.

General Body: Consists of 21 members ranging from diversified professionals and ethnicity of which 1/3 is female. GB consists of founder members, general members and life members. The authority of this committee is supreme. Members of this committee elect/nominate the Executive Committee for two years period. This committee will look into the accounts of the organization prepared by the EC. This committee approves the yearly budget, amend the constitution, and make the decision regarding the election. Two meetings of the committee held in a year.

Management: Within SJA the management system is participatory & decentralized, with program planning drawing on the experience and expertise of employees at all levels. SJA places great importance on building the capacity of individual employees and program participants. As such, all members of staff receive regular in-service training, annual appraisals and performance assessments. SJA has three tiers of management, these are:

1st Tier: Executive Committee - consists of 07 members represents a wide range of social strata, professions and experience and elects according to the procedures of the electoral role of the constitution for two years term. Year counts from January to December. The entire plan of the organization prepares according to the unanimous decisions of the committee. EC is responsible to implement and evaluate all the activities and maintain all the accounts of the organization. A Meeting of the committee will be held four times in a year. Emergency meetings call if necessary/needed.

The Executive Director (former UNV under UNDP Nepal, with having 31 years of diversified development experiences within the country and abroad through working with UN and International organizations) is the chief functionary of the organization and is accountable to the EC for the implementation of the Committee's decisions and the smooth functioning of programs.

2nd Tier: Senior Manageemnt Team (SMT) - Besides the 1st tier there is a Senior Management Team (SMT) to provide strategic guidance and day-to-day management of the project/program activities. SMT consists of 5 to 7 members they are the Executive Director (ED), Deputy Director, Assistant Director, Chief of Finance and Coordinators (both from program and finance). Normally the Executive Director will preside over the meeting and in-absence of ED the Chair will be the senior-most people who present in the meeting. The SMT reports directly to the Chairperson of the Executive Committee. The role of the SMT is to provide leadership to the program and project management as a whole and to assist the Executive Director decentralized his/her statutory responsibilities.

AND

3rd **Tier: Project Management Team (PMT)** - PMT is SJA's day to day project/program management related decision-making platform and from where the major issues taken to SMT for having strategic guidance. SMT is the 2nd tier management team of the organization that supports the executive committee and PMT is the 3rd tier management team to support the SMT. The all project and departmental focal persons (Director, Project Manager, Project Coordinators, and Finance Coordinator, etc.) are the members of the Project Management Team. The Chair will be rotated at each meeting through all members of PMT based on seniority. The PMT members meet monthly to provide an update on the project as well as discuss and seek support for the implementation challenges and difficulties. The other major responsibilities of this team are to decide which agenda should be taken to SMT for strategic guidance.


j) Human Resource

I) Operational Resources:

- Operational Resources: As a Sylhet-based NGO, SJA has the benefit of local knowledge of its working area. The organization employs a team of local staff who has intimate knowledge of Sylhet, its dialect, and customs. Furthermore, recognition to SJA's projects, such as its large HIV-AIDS program for sex workers & their clients, hotel workers & management; Reproductive Health Service Delivery project and the Community Clinic, enrolment of secondary school/college students in one of the key measures of integrated development will benefit from the knowledge and experiences obtained as a result of these other projects' activities.

SJA is fortunate to have a team of fully trained and also highly committed staff. All employees undergo regular periods of training in order to assist their professional development. The organization is based out of a fully equipped head office in Sylhet City and from here, support is given to the field/project offices. The head office also features training facilities.

- **Donor & Partner Relationships:** SJA has developed an impressive reputation amongst the donor community as an organization worth partnering with. Successful and long-term relationships have been established with other national and international NGOs and community groups.
- **Fields of Expertise:** SJA is experienced with a highly popular, dynamic program, ever-evolving in response to the changing needs of less advantaged especially tea garden community, poorest of the poor community along with successful strategies to solve current and emerging challenges.


